# Animal Health and Welfare Pathway Grants

The 'Animal health and Welfare pathway' grants are still open, in fact some people have claimed for it twice already! Registering for the scheme has become easier since it was first launched. You no longer need to 'register interest' and then wait for an invitation – sign up directly! The scheme is also no longer limited to only those who are BPS-eligible.

The requirements are:

- Minimum number of animals (21+ sheep, 11+ cattle, 51+ pigs)
- English CPH number (may be permanent or temporary)
- Single Business Identifier

You can apply for 1 review every 10 months, dated from when you sign up and receive an 'Agreement Number'. The 10 month period can only be waived if no funding is claimed meaning you can still only apply for funding for one species type every 10 months, but funding for multiple species is planned for the future (no launch date yet).

The AHWP was originally intended to last for 3 years. In 2026, DEFRA will review whether or not the scheme will be extended. See the 'useful resources' section of our website to find the application link.

# Cobalt deficiency in growing lambs

Trace element deficiencies like cobalt can be difficult to detect, due to causing vague clinical signs like poor growth, appetite, wool quality and fertility. It is rare in adults – weaned lambs are often the ones affected. This is why the disease is also known as "pine", as it was originally thought that the poor appetites were because the lambs were "pining" for their dam.

Cobalt plays an important role in the production of Vitamin B12 in the gut, which in turn is involved in the immune system. This means that cobalt-deficient animals will also have poor immunity and will be prone to pneumonia, parasites and clostridial diseases. In a case of severe cobalt deficiency, sheep will begin to show neurological signs, like stumbling in circles and pressing their heads against fences. At this point, the lack of cobalt and Vitamin B12 has caused damage to the liver, known as 'ovine white liver syndrome'.
